Getting Started with Cloth Nappies

Why choose cloth?

Cloth is reusable and more sustainable. Modern cloth nappies are an improved design to older style cloth nappies so they're easier and more convenient to use.

What are modern cloth nappies?

- Shaped like disposables easy to use and wear
- Made of a waterproof outer layer with absorbent inserts made from materials like bamboo, cotton, hemp or microfibre
- Easy to wash
- Change regularly like disposables
- Come in various styles, types, sizes and brands



It's not all or nothing.

Try using cloth nappies part-time to build your confidence. Some cloth users still use disposables overnight or on holidays.



Save money

Cloth nappies may cost more per nappy but you will save a lot more over time. Modern cloth nappies range from \$10-\$35 each.

An average user might buy around 30 at a total cost of approximately \$900. Even with the cost of laundry over three years (about \$300) you'll still **save over \$2100** by the time your baby is toilet trained.

What do I Need? Here's some things that might be useful when you start your cloth nappy journey:

- Modern cloth nappies
- Additional inserts to boost absorbency
- Reusable microfleece liners (optional)
- Wet bags good for out of home care
- Good quality detergent & stain remover
- An open, airy basket (dry pail)
- A silicone 'poo' brush & laundry bar soap
- Laundry wash bags
- Cloth wipes & small tub of plain water (no soap or oils)

Which Size?

Newborn size fits 2.5-7kg. One Size Fits Most (OSFM) fits 5kg until toilet training.



4 Which nappy insert material?

Bamboo is most common for good absorbency. You can use two inserts if your baby is a heavier wetter: one with high capacity and one fast absorber (on top).

*Microfibre should not touch skin directly

TIP: You can add a reusable microfleece liner on top to catch poos and draw moisture away from baby's bottom. Make your own cheaply by cutting rectangles from a microfleece blanket or buying material.

Washing

A good washing routine will get rid of stains and smells. How often you wash depends on how many nappies and how much drying space you have.

Every nappy needs to be pre-washed and washed again to be completely clean.

TIP: Be wary of washing advice suggesting using small amounts of eco-detergents, cold washing, vinegar as a stain remover or 'sunning' stains. This could lead to ammonia build-up and ammonia burn on your baby.

Basic washing routine*



Rinse poo and dry pail



Pre-wash every 1-2 days at 40°-60° ½ scoop detergent 30-60min cycle Dry pail while awaiting main wash



Main wash every 2-4 days at 40°-60° Full scoop detergent 2-3hr cycle



Line dry

FAQs

Where can I buy modern cloth nappies?

You'll find most options online however some department stores have limited options. Online groups can recommend brands that can withstand a thorough washing routine.

Should I buy brands made overseas?

There are many brands made in Australia. Imports can vary in quality, however some brands rate extremely well with consumers.

Should I buy secondhand?

Secondhand buying is a cost-effective way to trial styles and brands but be cautious. Always ask for detailed photos and check the condition of elastics, inserts and the waterproof lining before buying.

What about nappy rash?

Modern cloth nappies do not cause nappy rash if washed thoroughly. Nappy rash is caused by nappies being left on too long, general bacterial infections or high acid levels in urine. All rash creams will wash out of fabric with an effective wash routine.

Leaking or smelly nappies?

Try:

- Adjusting the fit, adding extra absorbency
